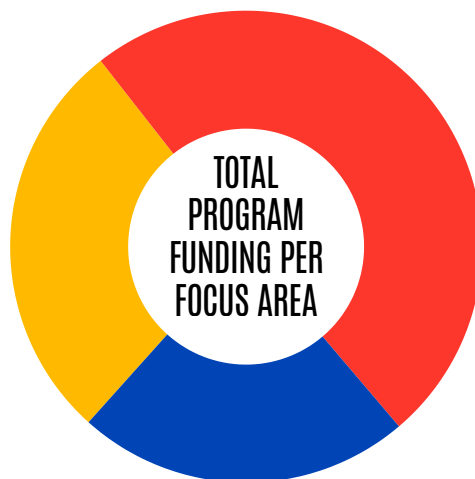

3:11 MINISTRIES mission is to bless local kids, they are always looking for more ways to do this. This year, they developed “The 3:11 Dorm Project.”

In partnership with Midland College and partially funded by United Way of Midland, The 3:11 Dorm Project serves college students who need that extra 3:11 blessing. Classified as homeless, these students have been accepted into the Midland College residence hall, ready to work toward a better future, but they arrive on campus with very few belongings and no family to outfit them for life on their own in a dorm.

They may have absolutely nothing or just a few belongings in a trash bag. They need everything from towels, to a lamp, to a laptop. This is where 3:11 steps in, blessing these students with all of the essentials of dorm life, plus some of the comforts of home. Now, instead of focusing on surviving, they may focus on thriving in their start on a new life.

PROSPERITY EMPLOYMENT OUTREACH Mobile Career & Clothing Trailer

Sarah came to Prosperity Employment Outreach determined to build a more stable future for herself and her son. After committing to a sober lifestyle, she participated in workforce readiness workshops, digital skills training, and one-on-one mentoring through the 3 Cups of Coffee program, while also utilizing the professional clothing closet and employment lead groups.

At the time she entered the program, Sarah was working low-wage cashier and shift-based jobs that offered little opportunity for advancement and limited time with her child. Through coaching focused on professional presentation, workplace communication, and interview preparation, she gained the confidence and skills needed to pursue a new career path.

With support from Prosperity staff and employer connections made through the program, Sarah secured her first professional office position with a local agency. The role provides consistent hours, greater stability, and a work environment that supports both her career growth and family life.

HOSPICE OF MIDLAND: RAYS OF HOPE CHILDREN'S GRIEF CENTER

Wellness Outreach Program

In 2025, Rays of Hope supported a young student grieving the loss of his father after a long illness. Following the loss, he became withdrawn, struggled in school, and often expressed anger and confusion he did not know how to process. Through the HopeWorks grief support program, he participated in weekly sessions focused on peer connection, emotional expression, and healthy coping skills. Over time, he began opening up and realized he was not alone in his grief.

His mother also participated in caregiver support sessions, where she gained tools to help her son while navigating her own loss. By the end of the program, his teacher reported he was more engaged in class and interacting positively with classmates again. His mother shared that their home environment improved because they now had healthy ways to talk openly about grief together.

In 2025 alone, 523 children participated in Rays of Hope programming, and 95.6% met key emotional and behavioral milestones.



SHARE

Family Support Program

Jaiden has been enrolled in SHARE for the past seven years. Diagnosed with Level 3 autism at age three, he was initially nonverbal and faced significant developmental challenges. His early years included seizures, sensory overwhelm, and difficulty participating in everyday activities, making even simple outings challenging for both Jaiden and his mother, Stephanie.

Through SHARE, Jaiden and his family found a supportive community and inclusive opportunities designed for children with special needs. Programs such as family events, respite care, and parent support helped Jaiden build confidence, strengthen social skills, and experience a sense of belonging within a caring and encouraging environment.

Today, Jaiden participates in TOPSoccer, an adaptive soccer program for children with special needs—an opportunity that once felt out of reach for his family. He continues to make progress in communication, independence, and engagement as his family celebrates milestones made possible through SHARE's ongoing support.
